

DISTRICT MEETINGS.

It would be interesting, if it were possible, to compile statistics showing what percentage of the members of the different associations attend the district meetings arranged for their benefit. We believe that, taken as a whole, the number of individual ringers who support these gatherings would prove to be comparatively small; for is it not the experience in almost every association that the members who attend the meetings are, for the most part, the same handful or two of stalwarts? A few fresh faces are to be found each time; but, generally speaking. it is the little band of 'regulars' in each district that makes for whatever success there is in these gatherings. We wonder whether, taking the year through, unless there are some special circumstances, any district gets fifty per cent. of its personnel to its meetings. Statistics might prove otherwise, but we doubt it. Yet it is these meetings which offer the best return for membership of an association. It is at district meetings that the indifferent ringer can get the best help and the aspiring ringer usually finds his most encouraging opportunities. There is seldom reason to grumble, from the instructional point of view, when a meeting is a comparatively small one, because small numbers mean more individual practice, but what association officials really complain of is that those who might most benefit from such opportunities do not avail themselves of them sufficiently often.

There are many ringers who belong to no association, because they think they will get nothing out of it. To begin with, that is the wrong spirit in which to approach the subject. As has been so often said, the object should be to see how much one can put into it, not in money, but in interest and effort and support. These will always bring their reward-not unmixed with disappointments, perhaps; but, nevertheless, providing the satisfaction which comes from making an effort for the common good. The mistake which is made by those who remain outside an association is that they do not know how much real interest and pleasure they can get out of sharing in its activities. It is the same with those who are members but who never attend the meetings. Their apathy and indifference robs them of a great deal of the interest which they would otherwise derive from their membership, as well as making it all the harder for the society's officials to carry on their work. Every member cannot, of course, attend every meeting in his district, but every well-conducted district brings at least one meeting, if not more, a year within reasonable reach of every member. and it ought to be considered a matter of duty, as well as being a pleasure, to every ringer to support his asso-(Continued on page 114.)

At the annual meeting of the Bristol Branch of the Gloucester and Bristol Diocesan Association, held at SS. 

THE COLLEGE YOUTHS.

To the Editor.

Sir,—Having in past years given some study to Osborn's manuscripts, I was much interested in Mr. Trollope's account of the College Youths and other London ringing societies, which appeared in your columns last autumn, and the excellent diagram with which he concluded them. I see no reason to accuse Osborn of jealousy or partiality. I consider him a straightforward narrator, and accept what he says about the happenings in 1788, which I stated in 'The Bell News

ell News years ago.

But this does not affect the wonderful continuity of the College

But this does not affect the wonderful continuity of the College Youths. It is a mere incident in their history, and it would be gedantic and not really true, in my opinion, to rate it any higher. The College Youths of to-day I consider to be the legitimate descendants of those of 1637.

I agree with what Mr. Trollope says in the paragraphs he has numbered 1, 2 and 3 in his letter appearing in your issue of November 20th last. But, nevertheless, I do not think the traditional origin of the College Youths' name, as I understand it, to he impossible; it seems to me quite likely to be true. Of course it remains a matter of opinion on which each man will use his own judgment. But there are, I think, some considerations connected with it to which our attention has been insufficiently or not at all directed, and about this I propose, with your permission, to say something and about this I propose, with your permission, to say something next week.

But at present I am constrained to dissent from Mr. Trollope's statement that 'the words College Youths mean literally schoolboys.' It presents to me the difficulty of anachronism. I believe that in the language of the seventeenth century the word 'College' did not mean 'school,' and so would not suggest a fancy name meaning schoolboys. The word college implies the constitution of a corporate body, and has publing more to do with education then anything else schoolboys. The word college implies the constitution of a comporate body, and has nothing more to do with education than anything else. The practice of applying it to schools for boys (and girls) to which we are now accustomed is quite of modern growth. In the seventeenth century schools were 'schools' and not 'colleges.'

Of course, I am open to authoritative correction, supplied by Mr. Trollope or anyone else; but till I get it I think he is mistaken, and that we cannot safely accept the meaning he gives to 'College Youthes'

The Rev. W. H. R. Trewhella (diocesan secretary) reported that five peals had been rung during the year—one of Grandsire Caters, three of Grandsire Triples and one of Bob Minor. He referred to the broadcasting of St. Hilary's bells and also the splendid work done in the East Cornwall Branch by the district secretary, Mr. H.

d. Clarke.

The Ringing Master and diocesan secretary were re-elected, but a message was brought from Dr. Symons by Mr. W. Wood (Gulval) saying he could no longer carry on the duties of treasurer, and the Ringing Master agreed to do the work.

Mr. W. Wallis (St. Gluvias) and Miss E. J. C. Angwin (Truro), were added to the committee.

added to the committee.

The revision of the rules caused a lengthy discussion, and the Ringing Master referred to the rule, 'That every ringer should attend throughout any service for which he rang.' He could not agree with this, and although ringers should be good churchman, it was bound to be broken at times, even by the most sincere. At the same time he referred to many notices often seen in the belfries: 'Hats off, please,' 'Please do not spit,' 'Silence,' etc. This sort of thing was not good enough for the present day, and he resented it. The choir and sidesmen did not have such things pinned to their seats, and why should ringers be treated in that manner?

A QUESTION OF HONOUR.

DEATH OF AN OLD SUSSEX RINGER.

MR. JAMES LIVERMORE PASSES AWAY AT IPSWICH.

We regret to record the death of Mr. James Livermore on January 30th, at his residence, 19. Kitchener Road, Ipswich, where he had lived since his retirement 14 months ago. Mr. Livermore, who
