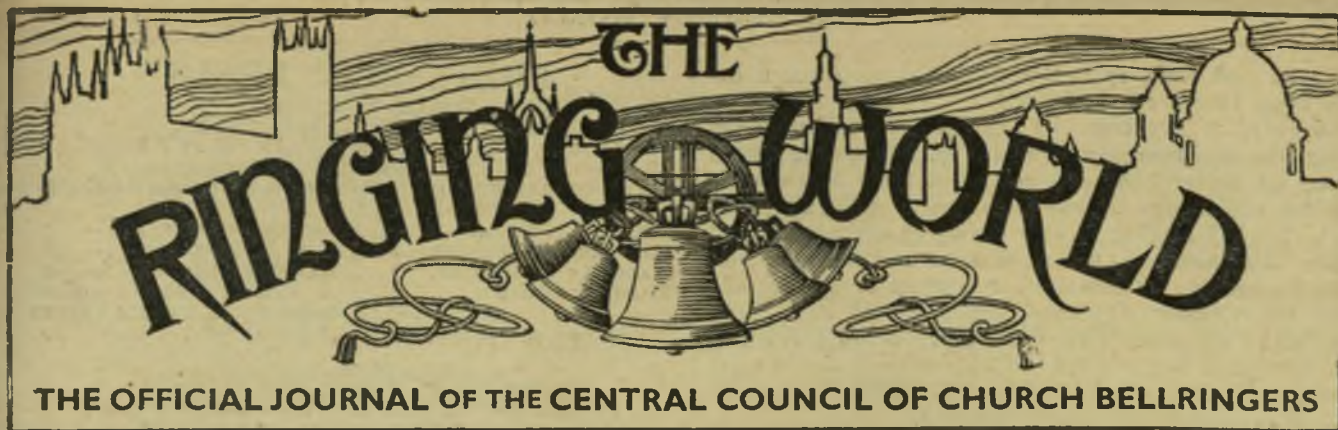

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THE ANALYSIS

Five columns in this issue are occupied by printing the analysis of peals rung on tower bells during 1946. The space is not wasted. Tabulated in this fashion, it is possible for the practised eye to discern the trend of change ringing. The year 1946, with 1,795 peals, of which 1,555 were on tower bells, was a good ringing year and compared favourably with pre-war peal ringing. It marked a great advance on 1945, when the aggregate of peals was 1,304, with 1,126 on tower bells. The year was not only a good year as regards the number of peals but also as to the quality. There was an adventurous spirit afoot; a desire for variety in more difficult methods which was an encouraging sign.

More peals were also rung on higher numbers of bells. While in 1945 only nine peals of Maximus were scored, the number reached 15. Particularly praiseworthy was the work of the Leicester Guild with six peals of Surprise Maximus. In regard to Cinques, St. Martin's Guild stand pre-eminent with 12 peals of Stedman out of a total of 39. Cinques rung in 1945 were only 24 peals against 42. Peals of Royal showed a marked increase from 37 to 68. These peals were divided among 32 Associations, compared with 17 in 1945. Caters, however, still hold an unchallenged popularity in 10-bell towers with 86 peals. In this class of ringing the Worcestershire and Districts with seven peals head the list.

The most impressive thing about Major ringing was the big increase in Surprise peals. Of 676 peals, more than 40 per cent., or 282, were in Surprise methods. The previous year the total was 156 out of 464. Surprise peals were in 19 different methods, as against 14. Conspicuous is the list of the Kent County Association, with 14 peals of Cambridge and peals in 13 other Surprise methods. Double Norwich, with 115 peals, an increase of 21, was rung by 33 different Associations, compared with 21 in 1945. This method was most popular in Lancashire, with 16 peals. A similar honour is also held by Lancashire with regard to Treble Bob methods; in fact, peal ringing advanced considerably during the year in this Association. Peals of Plain Bob were almost stationary, numbering 137. With the desire for higher methods, Triples with 238 peals were only eleven more than in 1945, and it is in the Southern Counties that the desire for this class of ringing is most strong. Guildford head the list with 22 peals, followed by Oxford Diocesan

Guild 20 and Kent 17. Grandsire Triples show a decline from 146 to 127 peals.

Roughly, 22 per cent. of the peals recorded were Minor, the total being 339 against 177. These were spread among 41 different Associations, and there is no question that the number of first peals was as great as in any year. Six-bell ringing is very strong in the agricultural Guilds—Lincolnshire, Oxford, Chester and Salisbury, all being prominent. There were two peals in 25 methods from the Chester Diocesan Guild which have been dwarfed by the performance of 1947. While there was little change in the number of Doubles peals, 94 against 89, the enthusiasm of the Bath and Wells Diocesan Guild with 18 peals calls for special mention.

The Kent County Association have the distinction of being at the head of the table with 125 peals (14 in hand), their total having been swelled by some successful tours. Other leading Associations are Lancashire 103 (4 in hand), Leicester 97 (32), Oxford Diocesan 96 (3), Yorkshire 92 (1), Lincoln 90 (15), Chester 83 (7), Middlesex 76 (39), Essex 70 (28), Norwich 69 (3). Last year the pride of place was held by the Midland Counties with 93 peals. This Association has been divided into three, and Leicester with 97 peals, in gaining third place, have had a very busy year.

Many will doubtless endeavour to cap Mr. Eric Nobles' oddity of ringing from a chair. From Somerset comes the story of the treble rope being so long that the sally nearly reached the floor. A youthful performer was equal to the occasion and rang it while kneeling on a hassock. He was able to control the bell perfectly in this posture, but nearly hanged himself with the superfluous rope when standing up.

A frequent saying of Mr. William Robinson, sexton and verger of Ambleside, Westmorland, who had dug 600 graves in his time, was, 'Nobody will ever sweat to dig a grave for me.' They did not. He was cremated at Blackpool. A memoir of this well-known Lancashire ringer appears in this issue.

Birmingham ringers were surprised recently to find in 'The Birmingham Mail' a photograph taken in the belfry of St. Martin's of Mr. Albert Walker, with Mr. George Swann and Mr. Frank Smallwood. The occasion merited a picture, for it was Mr. Smallwood's 100th peal on 12 bells, his 100th peal with Mr. Walker and his 100th peal for the Guild.

Seven members were ringing their first quarter of Grandsire at St. Nicholas' Church, Ash, near Canterbury, on August 17th, when the bells were half-muffled for the unveiling of the memorial to the fallen, 1939-45. The exception was W. Bottrill. The band was Miss E. J. Holman 1, A. C. Gambrill 2, Miss D. M. Jenner 3, J. D. Ogilvy 4, W. Bottrill 5, W. C. E. Goldup 6, E. J. Wells (conductor) 7, A. Kemp 8.

Enjoying her honeymoon this week near Sandown, Isle of Wight, is Miss Mary H. Cole, daughter of Canon and Mrs. Cole, of Oatlands Vicarage, Weybridge. Miss Cole was married to Mr. L. F. BELFRY GOSSIP

Four peals were rung to the memory of Mr. J. Armiger Trollope. Mr. C. W. Roberts, the Master of the Middlesex Association, conducted a peal of Cambridge Surprise at Willesden, and the secretary of the Association that at Acton, which was a composition of Mr. Trollope's. The third peal was at Norwich and the fourth at Bromley, Kent.

It was at St. Peter Mancroft that Mr. Trollope rang his first peal on tower bells on June 8th, 1893, he having been elected a member of the Norwich Diocesan Association the previous year. Mr. Nolan Golden called this peal of Bob Major, 5,248 changes, the composition containing the extent of the combination of 4-5-6 in 5-6 and the 7648's and 7468's at course-ends. An attempt for a peal of Caters two days previously was lost after an hour's ringing owing to the tenor rope breaking.

Stationed at Gaza, Southern Palestine, 19059349 L.-Cpl. Turner R., 201 Provost Company, R.M.P., British Forces in Palestine, is anxious to hear of any other Service ringers stationed in this area. He receives 'The Ringing World' weekly and would be pleased to pass on his copy.

Misfortune befel Mr. Tony Appleton, of Godalming, during a ringing tour in Hants, Dorset, Somerset and Wilts. Cycling down a hill near Melksham, he collided with a motor-car. COLLEGE YOUTHS HONOUR JOHN HARDHAM

It will be remembered that in 1946 members of the Ancient Society of College Youths kept green the memory of Benjamin Annable, who was Master 201 years ago. Annable was succeeded as Master by John Hardham, one of the members of his famous band. A happy suggestion by Mr. E. Alex. Young resulted in between 40 and 50 members of the Society visiting Chichester on August 9th to honour the memory of this famous Master of 200 years ago.

Perfect weather favoured the visitors, who were received by Mr. R. G. Blackman and the local Ringing Master, Mr. Falconer.

The bells at the Campanile were soon set going to well-struck touches in various methods up to London Surprise. Tea was served at the Tower Cafe and a distinguished company, including the Precentor of the Cathedral, the Mayor of Chichester, the president of the Central Council and the Master, secretary, treasurer and stewards of the Society, did ample justice to the good fare provided.

The company then adjourned to the Cathedral, where, on behalf of the Dean and Chapter, the Rev. Brown-Wilkinson very graciously welcomed the visitors.

The Mayor of Chichester, on behalf of the civic authorities, also welcomed them and paid a high tribute to John Hardham and the Society, of which he was Master and such a prominent member. The Master, Mr. G. W. Cecil, expressed the thanks of the visitors and called upon Mr. E. Alex. Young to say a few words about the purpose of the visit.

Mr. Young spoke of the sterling character of John Hardham, who was a native of Chichester. He came to London and founded a business in Fleet Street (just a few yards away from St. Bride's Church), which prospered and attracted many famous people to his shop, including the great actor, David Garrick. There was no picture of him which could give an idea of his appearance, but he pictured Hardham as a man of slight build, as he was inclined to ring at the front end.

Hardham was a great friend of the poor and very often he provided deserving cases with an annuity out of his own pocket. After making several bequests, he left the residue of his fortune—about £22,500—for the relief of the poor rates at Chichester. That was a

very considerable sum in those days and would be in present-day values roughly about £100,000. Hardham was a man of very simple tastes and directed that not more than £10 should be spent on his funeral. Mr. Young mentioned that he had recently visited Hardham's shop and had purchased a supply of his famous snuff taken from the '37' box. The Mayor of Chichester tried this and pronounced it to be excellent. Photographs having been taken, a company of College Youths ascended the tower and rang a service touch of Stedman Triples: E. G. Fenn treble, W. H. Pasmore 2, A. A. Hughes 3, J. Waugh 4, J. F. Smallwood 5, E. H. Lewis 6, R. F. Deal 7, A. B. Peck tenor.

At the business meeting which followed, six new members were unanimously elected to the Ancient Society, and hearty thanks were accorded to Mr. Blackman for making such splendid arrangements for the comfort of the party.

Altogether a most enjoyable and successful gathering, and the visitors returned to London, Portsmouth and other places with happy memories of Chichester and John Hardham.

OBITUARY

DEATH OF A LANCASHIRE STALWART.

On August 11th, Lancashire lost one of its real backbone members by the death of Mr. William Robinson, of Ambleside.

In 1904 he was the pioneer in forming the Furness Branch of the Lancashire Association and its first secretary, a position he held for 15 years. He was a keen ringer and instructor.

His keen interest may be gauged from the following exploit—one of many. He followed a Rugby team, and when they visited South Lancashire he would be running about the field all the afternoon, have tea, then ring in a peal. The train service home was inconvenient, causing him several hours' waiting at Preston, and then it only took him to Oxenholme, whence he was faced with a '6 miles' walk home. This he did, and he was always in his place in the belfry at 10 a.m. He would attend meetings at Kendal and then walk the 14 miles to his home.

Mr. Robinson was the caretaker at Ambleside Church for 20 years, and his genial disposition to everybody, whether ringers or not, caused him to be well known. This was shown by the large attendance at the church on Wednesday prior to the cremation at Carlton, Blackpool.

Although the time of the service was inconvenient and such short notice, there were over 30 ringers present. These included representatives from the following branches, viz., N. Newby, Furness; John Woods, Lancaster;

William Taylor, Preston; Peter Crook, Bolton; and W. H. Trueman and his son, of Swindon, who were staying in the district.

He must have been well known to many ringers outside Lancashire, because Ambleside is a popular holiday resort and he always accompanied the members of the National Police Guild to their annual meetings.

He rang and conducted many peals, but his pet performance was a 720 Bob Minor, rung double handed and 'silent' in a train whilst returning from a monthly meeting with Alf Brighton and another.

A widow and son are left to mourn their loss. The son is a regular ringer at Manchester Town Hall.

At a meeting at Kendal on Saturday last the members stood in silence to show their respect. For the service and during the afternoon Ambleside bells were rung fully muffled.

MR. J. A. GODFREY.

We regret to announce the death of Mr. John Arthur Godfrey, of Caythorpe, Grantham, and formerly of Gressenhall, Norfolk, on August 19th. He had been ailing since Whitsun, when he suffered an attack of bronchial pneumonia, from which he never fully recovered. He was 73.

Mr. Godfrey was for many years Ringing Master of North-West Norfolk, and he retained his characteristically keen interest in the activities of his numerous ringing friends right up to the time of his death.

AN OUTING IN WARWICKSHIRE

Ringers from Burford, Oxford, had their outing on August 9th. Departing at 8.50 a.m., the journey was made via Stow-on-the-Wold, and the descent of the steep hill into Broadway, in perfect summer weather, afforded a magnificent view of the landscape. The first tower of the day was Badsey, Worcs., where an hour's ringing on the pleasant toned eight was enjoyed by all.

Stratford-on-Avon was reached shortly before noon, and after more ringing in this spacious belfry the party adjourned to the Royal Hotel, where an excellent lunch was served.

The next tower to be visited was St. Mary's Collegiate Church, Warwick, where Grandsire and Stedman Caters were the popular methods on this fine ring of ten. The writer also had the privilege of playing on the magnificent organ at this church. The coach was again boarded, to reach Leamington Spa a few minutes later, where the bells were soon set going to the standard methods, and the ringing on this delightful eight was a pleasure to all.

Tea was found in this town, which afforded a rest and put everyone in form for the last tower of the day—Southam. More Oddities

Dear Sir,—Mr. Eric Nobles' memory must be very short about his illustrated oddity of ringing from a chair, or he would remember ringing with myself and others at Oundle last Boxing Day, where the treble man has to look up at the person on the 2nd, who rings from a similar contraption (only with no chair back to it), and the fourth ringer has to look up at the person on the 3rd, who rings from the stone steps as you enter the belfry. Between the 2nd and 3rd is the clock case. The ropes fall in a more or less half-circle.

There is also an oddity at Saddington, Leicestershire, where the 2nd ringer of the five has to stand on a stone platform above the level of the others to ring. When I got the ban removed on the ringing of Kelmarsh bells on December 14th, 1944 (and Mr. Frank Tysoe will bear me out), to try them we had to borrow four ropes from Bromham. One of these was very short, and the ringer had to stand on two hassocks mounted on top of a wooden form about 4ft. above the others. The bells had not been rung for 15 years owing to a dispute with the late Rector. Kelmarsh bells are now ringing once again. They are an interesting ring of six, all by Edward Arnold, 1774, tenor 9½ cwt. Shortly they are to be put on ball bearings, and contributions to the Rector, Canon Cattell, would be welcomed. About £230 is required.

The number of these variations is strictly limited, and, in fact, they have already been worked out theoretically. So I fear there is no hope of further compositions being produced on this plan. Even six and three-part peals have been pretty well worked out.—Yours faithfully,
