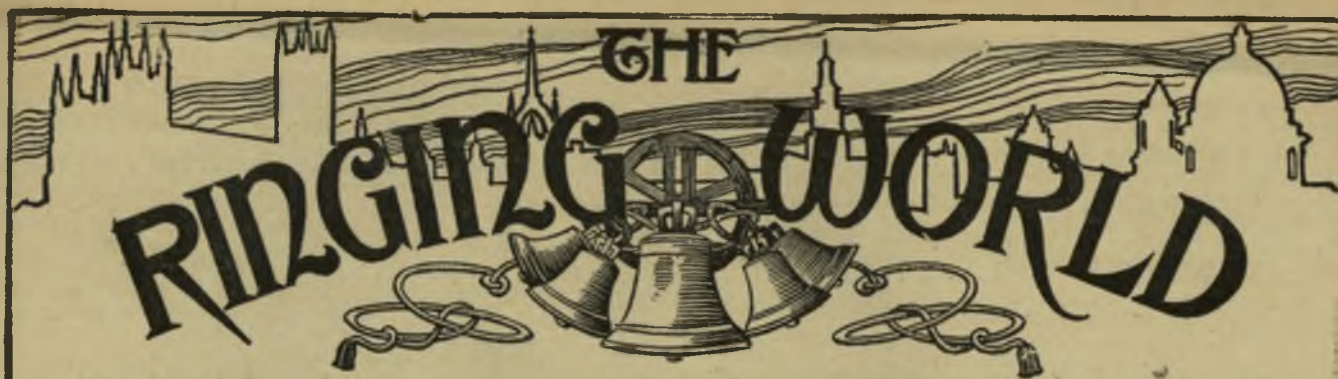

'RINGING TOWERS'

'The Ringing World' is not the only publication devoted exclusively to the art of change ringing. Last April 'The Ringing Towers,' the monthly journal of the New South Wales Association, made its first appearance, and the four issues which have reached us via Mr. A. G. Williams, of Bexley, Kent, are good reading. Much of the information is intimate and personal, but most issues contain an article of instructional value.

The New South Wales Association was formed in February, 1946, and since then has made considerable progress in raising the standard of ringing and in getting bells ringing again, not only in Sydney, its birthplace, but also in outlying places in N.S.W. The Association feels that the best method of establishing ties between the various centres of ringing in Australasia is by the journal, 'Ringing Towers,' and while present issues are in typescript it is to be hoped that funds will permit of a printed publication at an early date.

Although the standard of change ringing in Australia is below that of any Diocesan Guild or County Association in this country, the New South Wales Association embarked on a courageous policy when it was formed. The qualification of membership is the ability to ring a working bell to 120 changes of Doubles. Commonplace as this rule is to us, it was a revolutionary step to them, as no other organisation in Australasia had set any similar condition on membership. The qualification was difficult to introduce in the rules, as out of 40 odd foundation members only eight to ten could ring 120 changes of Doubles. To accommodate the majority, probationary membership was introduced.

Already 'Ringing Towers' has contacted the Christchurch Cathedral Society, New Zealand, and this society are giving the new venture every support. Apart from the Christchurch Society, other keen ringers in New Zealand are Mr. A. Roberts, of New Plymouth, Mr. Barnett, of Wellington, and the composer, Mr. J. S. Wilde, of Dunedin. At the moment, the Christchurch Society are trying to get a 720 of Plain Bob Minor on the light six. The ten bells at Christchurch are rung every Sunday. There is a ring of five at Papanui, three miles out, and hopes are entertained of buying or casting a treble for this church.

To Mr. W. M. Rowe, who we believe is acting as Editor, we wish every success. The first issue contained an Easter message from the Right Rev. C. V. Pilcher, Bishop Coadjutor of Sydney. He writes, 'I can never

forget the bells of the churches of the English countryside at the season of Easter. I was in charge of a beautiful church among the Cotswold Hills of Gloucestershire. The sound of pealing bells, rung by the skilful English bellringers, floating over valley and hill from a neighbouring village, filled the air.'

CAMBRIDGE UNIVERSITY GUILD TOUR

The annual ringing week was held from September 1st to 6th at Birmingham, headquarters being at Primrose Hill, Selly Oak, and arrangements being in the very capable hands of Frank Haynes. Other members present were E. M. Atkins, Dr. Poole, M. Lindley, R. Leigh, J. Butler, W. H. J. Hooton, C. W. Woolley, P. Williamson, B. Price, A. Rousel, Dr. Cunningham, G. Dodds and the Revs. E. G. Benson, B. F. Sheppard and A. G. G. Thurlow. Some of these were only present part of the time.

During a fairly good peal of Cambridge on September 1st at St. Laurence's, Northfield, amongst the many 'phone calls received by the Vicar was one asking whether 'those diabolical and selfish people' might be stopped—despite this we went on to the bitter end. Touches at Edgbaston concluded a pleasant opening day. On September 2nd a peal of Bob Royal was greatly enjoyed on the grand new ten at Solihull, and the afternoon passed pleasantly with Double Norwich, etc., at Shirley; one of H.P.'s queer touches—spliced Grandsire and Stedman—at King's Norton; then a visit to the carillon at Bournville, whose keyboard proved too great a temptation for some members. A very pleasant evening was spent at St. Martin's with members of the local band.

On September 3rd we visited Walsall, where we were encouraged to read on a peal board that on October 17th, 1859, a 'true and excellent peal of Grandsire Majors, 5,007 changes, was rung in one lesson.' Despite this encouragement, Little Bob Royal went west after 26 minutes, after which we rang a quarter-peal in the same method by way of 'prep' for our next lesson. We greatly enjoyed this fine twelve, also lunch at the George. We were interested to note here that on February 4th, 1861, 10.032 Grandsire Majors was rung in excellent style, also on June 20th, 1843, 7,248 Grandsire Majors was rung in a masterly style—our style had been too quick, and for our quarter-peal we tried to 'go slow and strike,' which policy proved more successful in ringing than in some other spheres. Walsall possesses two churchwardens and two foreign wardens, of what nationality we did not discover. It also has a peal board recording on October 25th, 1809, 5,040 Bob Majors, on the Grand National Jubilee.

Tamworth, our next tower, more appropriately records in 1913 a peal for the 1,000 year millenary of Tamworth Castle. This tower possesses a most convenient arrangement of two spiral staircases arranged round one newel. This is not immediately obvious to the visitor, and if a peal band were to notice a hostile crowd coming up one stair, they could silently descend the other stair. On the way from Tamworth, one car load nearly came to blows on the question whether such a stair could have both its bottom doors at the same level or not. Peace prevailed, and we enjoyed the pleasant eights at Sutton Coldfield and Erdington. In the evening we had a good time at St. Mary's, Selly Oak, and finished up with a business meeting, at which we decided to hold the 1948 week at Manchester if possible.

On September 4th some took part in a peal attempt at Willenhall, followed by a course of Cambridge Royal, whilst others rang at Lye, on England's lightest eight—the tenor weighs 3½ cwt. and the treble 60 pounds. The bells have to be rung 'wrong clappered' or the clappers will not strike hard enough. Despite these difficulties, several touches were more or less successfully completed. Then to the fine eight at St. Thomas', Stourbridge, and an enjoyable ring at Brierley Hill. The undersigned 'scribe' had to leave at this point, and takes no responsibility for the accuracy or otherwise of what follows.

Undismayed, the rest lunched at Dudley. At Wednesbury, Cambridge Royal, etc., were rung on a fine ten recently rehung by G. and J. At Coseley, hidden in the Black Country, the eight rehung by Taylor in 1936 provided

enjoyment, as did tea kindly provided by some of the local band. A poem on the wall, including 'He giveth water for His thirsty children to drink,' aroused feelings of more or less sympathy amongst various readers. At Halesowen the Ringing Master was not unnaturally surprised to hear Cambridge, etc., emerge from the tower, as he had not been advised of our visit. Birmingham Cathedral that evening provided another welcome opportunity to ring with local members.

On September 5th, Holy Communion was celebrated by B. F. Sheppard for members at St. Mary's, Selly Oak; a very successful morning followed for the 14 who now comprised the party, as between them they rang a peal of Bob Major at Edgbaston and Cambridge Minor on the back six at Selly Oak. After lunch the fine 12 at Aston were rung to Stedman Cinques and Caters, also Little Bob Royal with the back bells in the 'Tittum'—one of B.P.'s novelties. London, etc., followed at Bishop Ryder's, and in the evening there was a visit to St. Peter's, Harborne, five of whose bells are by William Bagley, 1691.

On September 6th a good peal of Double Norwich was rung at St. Chad's. This was officially the end of the Guild week, but some members were privileged to take part in a peal of Stedman Caters at St. Philip's that afternoon, for the St. Martin's Guild, and some remained for Sunday morning.

We had too few members, we felt, to attempt a twelve-bell peal, but the week was highly successful, and we were most grateful to the weather, the local ringers, our very kind hosts at Primrose Hill, to the various tower keepers, the car drivers, and to F.E.H. for his organising.

For many years the late Mr. Rupert Richardson entertained his ringing friends to a week-end at Glyn Garth, Surfleet, and this year Mrs. Rupert Richardson kindly sent invitations, the objective being a peal attempt at Lincoln Cathedral, arranged by Mr. John Freeman, and the dedication of an electric chiming clock in St. Lawrence's Church tower, Surfleet, which was given by Mr. Rupert Richardson, he having placed the order during his lifetime.

The Birmingham and Coventry contingents arrived at Surfleet on Friday, and the London contingent on the Saturday. After a substantial lunch, three cars set out for the 38-mile drive to Lincoln, where tea was provided by Mr. and Mrs. John Freeman. At the Cathedral the other members of the peal band had already gathered, and the visitors were welcomed by the Cathedral ringers.

The peal, Stedman Cinques, was successful in 3 hours and 47 minutes, and it is interesting to note the band represented Guildford 2, London 2, Newcastle-on-Tyne 1, Spalding 1, Leversock Green 1, Coventry 1, Lincoln 1, and Birmingham 3.

Following the peal, the visitors were again entertained to a substantial meal at Mr. and Mrs. John Freeman's. It was midnight by the time the company reached Surfleet. After the service a course of Stedman Triples was rung over Rupert Richardson's grave by G. F. Swann, F. E. Pervin, A. H. Pulling and A. Walker. The tower bells were also rung to various touches on 12, 10 and 8 bells.

Tea was kindly provided by Mrs. Richardson and Enid on the spacious lawn at Glyn Garth, approximately forty friends being present. Afterwards handbell ringing—Stedman Cinques, Treble Twelve, Erin and Double Norwich Major—previous to ringing for evening service on the grand eight at Pinchbeck Church.

Afterwards again to Glyn Garth, where farewells were said to Mr. and Mrs. John Freeman and their two sons, John A. and P. Michael Freeman, Mr. and Mrs. C. McGuinness, Walter Ayre, A. H. Pulling, A. H. May, Miss Fiddell, and to Mr. and Mrs. Jack Bray. Also to the local ringers, with many thanks to Mrs. Richardson and Enid, who had so generously and warmly entertained them.

The Birmingham, Coventry and London visitors returned home on Tuesday morning with many expressions of gratitude for a very good week-end, such as Rupert would have wished it to be.

OBITUARY

MR. THOMAS W. CHAPMAN.

The death of Mr. T. W. Chapman, of Nuneaton, occurred on Sept. 13th, the date of his golden wedding. Mr. Chapman had been in failing health for the last five months due to a seizure which rendered useless his power of speech. Another seizure a week before his death rendered him unconscious, and he passed peacefully away without fully regaining consciousness. He leaves a widow, one son (Mr. S. T. Chapman, of Nuneaton) and a daughter (Mrs. T. H. Payne, of Worcester).

Mr. Chapman was in his 80th year and for over 60 years he rang at Nuneaton Parish Church, serving also as a sidesman for many years. He would often recount the early struggles of the Nuneaton Society to ring Grandsire Doubles for Sunday services and how they progressed until Surprise Major was the rule rather than the exception.

A good all-rounder, Mr. Chapman as a teacher was unsurpassed. The present band at Chilvers Coton owe much to his patient endeavour. Whatever the ringing had been, for peal, practice, or service, Tom loved a good fall in peal, and to see him lower the treble so faultlessly, and to hear his famous 'Don't thrash 'em about,' are things which will long be remembered.

Blitzed out of Nuneaton in 1941, he resided with his daughter in Worcester until May this year, when he returned to Nuneaton. He was a Freeman of the Coventry Diocesan Guild, of which he was a founder member. He also served the Guild as Ringing Master 1924-1930. Although his peal records were destroyed, he is known to have rung 119 (including the 12,896 Cambridge Surprise Major) for the Midland Counties Association and 193 for the Coventry Diocesan Guild, of which latter total he had conducted 11. His first peal was rung at Nuneaton Parish Church on April 13th, 1889, and his last at the same tower on July 15th, 1946.

The funeral took place on Sept. 16th. A short service in the church he loved preceded the interment in Nuneaton Cemetery, the Vicar (the Rev. F. S. Herbert) officiating. The bearers were Messrs. A. H. Beamish, J. E. Moreton and J. Lloyd, of Coton, and G. J. Stoneley, of Nuneaton. In addition to the family mourners a number of friends followed, including Mrs. D. E. Beamish, hon. secretary of the Guild, and Mrs. H. Billington (Nuneaton). Ringers present were L. J. Hinde and F. Ashley (Bulkington), J. Beale (Wolvey), F. Brassington, G. Freeman and A. Roberts (Stoke), W. Aldridge (Nuneaton). A course of Grandsire Triples was rung over the grave by H. Summers 1-2, J. H. White 3-4, F. E. Pervin 5-6, and J. Taylor 7-8.

In the evening the bells of the Parish Church were rung half-muffled to a quarter-peal of Stedman Triples, those taking part being L. Trevor 1, Mrs. D. E. Beamish 2, J. E. Moreton 3, J. Dravcott 4, G. J. Stoneley 5, J. Gibbons 6, E. H. Stoneley (conductor) 7, J. Thompson 8. A.H.B.

MR. FRANK NEWMAN.

A well-known Essex and Metropolitan ringer, Mr. Frank Newman, of Upton Park, died on September 14th, aged 73. He was one of the oldest members of the College Youths.

His first peal, Kent Treble Bob, was rung on February 13th, 1898, and of those who participated only two are now alive—Mr. T. H. Taffender and Mr. A. W. Brighton. Mr. Newman was a member of the old West Ham band, of which the only survivor is Mr. G. Haydon, who still rings, though advanced age (87) does not allow him to do much.

Messrs. T. H. Taffender, G. Dawson, G. Faulkner, C. Fenn, G. Haydon and R. W. Stannard attended the funeral at the City of London Cemetery, Manor Park, on Friday, September 19th, and it was noticed that another ringer, Mr. H. T. Pye, of Colchester, a brother-in-law of deceased, was amongst the mourners. R.W.S.

REV. D. W. W. CARMICHAEL.

By the death of the Rev. D. W. W. Carmichael, M.A., Vicar of Tenterden, Kent, at the age of 67 years, St. Mildred's Church ringers have lost a good friend. He had been Vicar of Tenterden for 13 years, and anything he could do for the ringers he was always pleased to do.

MR. JOHN MARDELL.

The Peterborough Diocesan Guild has sustained a great loss by the death of Mr. John Marcell at the age of 78. He was not only captain of the Sulgrave ringers, but, writes the Rev. W. S. Pakenham-Walsh, he was recognised as one of the leading campanologists in the diocese.

He will indeed be sorely missed not only in his own home circle, and in the garden where he was such a skilled and faithful worker, but also in the larger life of the church and village. He not only called people to the church services with his bell, but he was a regular worshipper and communicant himself and thereby set all a fine example.

The large number in the church at his funeral on August 16th was an eloquent testimony to the respect in which he was held, and in the congregation were bellringers from Helmdon and Lois Weedon, who placed a wreath upon his grave and then joined with the Sulgrave ringers in a muffled touch.

MR. BERTRAM WINDMILL.

For over 50 years a regular service ringer at St. Mary's, Hendon, Middlesex, Mr. Bertram Windmill died on Sept. 7th in his 71st year. Of late owing to ill-health he was unable to attend regularly.

The funeral was at Hendon on Sept. 13th, and in the evening at the Parish Church the bells were rung half-muffled—the whole pull and stand 71 times by R. Charge 1, P. Holman 2, F. A. Barker 3, B. Begrie 4, E. Prackett 5, W. Barnard 6. Followed by 1,440 Bob Minor (half-muffled) by F. Cherrett 1, R. Charge 2, G. Charge 3, B. Begrie 4, E. Prackett 5, F. A. Barker (conductor) 6.

LICHFIELD SEE THEIR NEW BELLS

Ringers from Lichfield, with ringing friends from Tamworth, had their outing on Sept. 6th. Loughborough Foundry, the objective, was reached at 3 p.m., where the party were met by Mr. J. P. Fidler, who conducted them round the works. Great interest was shown in the new bells for the Cathedral.
