#### WINCHESTER

ONE of the oldest of our Diocesan Associations is the Winchester and Portsmouth Diocesan Guild, formed at Basingstoke on June 26th, 1879. The 70th anniversary was duly honoured by a representative gathering, and this week we chronicle the annual meeting of the Guild, with the election of a new Master in the person of Mr. George Pullinger. He succeeds the late Mr. George Williams. The report fittingly pays tribute to the memory of Mr. Williams, who almost from the inception of the Guild had been connected prominently with its affairs, notably as general secretary and lastly as Master, and one of its representatives on the Central Council. As a memorial to his work the members propose to provide a bookcase for their library, in particular to take the valuable collection of ringing literature that he bequeathed to the Guild. There is also talk of a national memorial, and it was suggested that this might take the form of an augmentation of the bells of his own tower, North Stoneham.

The past year has been a good one for the Guild, and the secretary (Mr. F. W. Rogers) was able to report increased activity in all districts. The year has been noteworthy for bell restorations. There was the opening of the grand ring of 10 at St. Mary's, Southampton, and the augmentation of St. Michael's, Southampton, from 8 to 10. Another augmentation was in the New Forest town of Lyndhurst to eight. Tichborne bells have been recast, and repairs have been carried out at Shedfield. Three other schemes are under review—the six bells at Bramley are to be recast, a new frame fitted and two new trebles added; Sparsholt, where a young team is learning under Mr. Bullen, hope to have their bells overhauled; and Wolverton expect to have their bells ringing again this year, where a new frame has been fitted and the bells overhauled.

Winchester and Portsmouth was one of the first Guilds to meet the new set of circumstances arising from the war by an increase in the subscription of ringing members from 2s. to 3s. 'We do not feel we shall lack the support of the majority, if not all, of the members in this united effort to restore our financial stability again,' comments the hon. treasurer (Mr. W. Linter). Membership has shown a slight increase from the previous year. Generally the reports of the district secretaries make pleasant reading. An exception is Winchester. Mr. J. A. C. King, the district secretary, writes: 'In general, interest in this District is at present sadly lacking. Of 20 towers affiliated, there are only seven which have a weekly practice night, and of these two or three towers cancel this practice during the summer. There are many members who are content to stand by and keep the flag flying.'

Peals rung during the year totalled 72 (45 tower, 27 hand), an increase of nine. Mr. Arthur V. Davis, the peal recorder, points out that there were 15 first peals and 100 first peals in the method. Of performances, he states that Portsmouth ringers scored Spliced Major as well as the first peal of Rutland for the Guild, and a neat little tit-bit was the peal of London Surprise Minor rung on the 'Holyrood' six at St. Michael's, Southampton. His report concludes: 'One gets the impression that there may be a little hardening of public opinion against prolonged ringing in some areas, therefore we are indeed grateful to those incumbents who so readily give consent for an attempt to be made.'

The annual general meeting was held at Southampton on July 2nd, and was representative of all districts of the Guild.

The districts were also invited to adopt a rota of meetings which had been drawn up, with a view to avoiding any undue clashing of meet-ings in adjacent districts. This is to be in-troduced after the next annual district meet-
