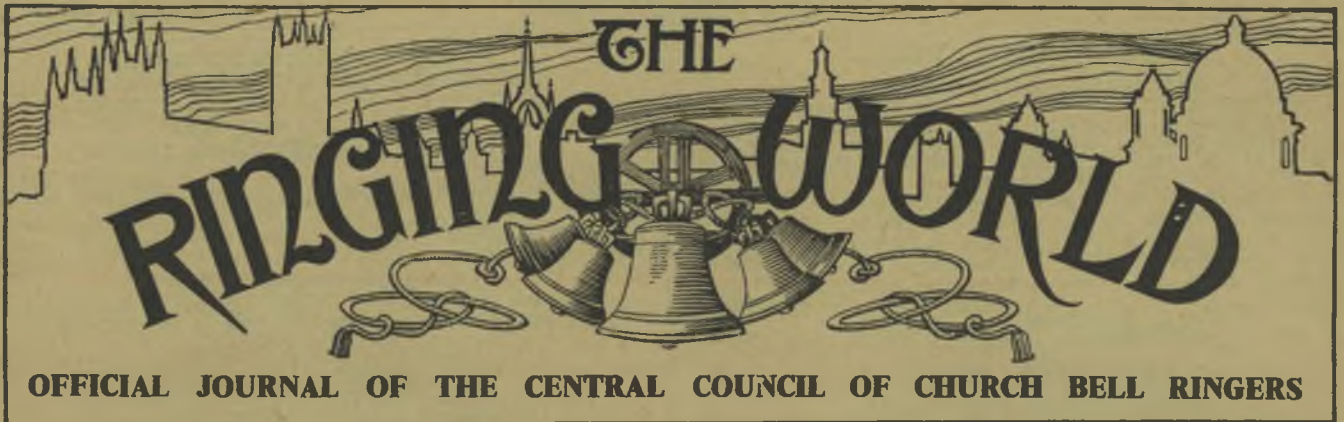

OUR FIRST RINGERS' MEETING

ON November 1st, All Saints' Day, my wife Joan and I attended our first ringers' meeting. Being complete novices in the art of change-ringing (we are struggling with what, to us, are the intricacies of Grandsire Doubles), we did not quite know how we should fare in the company of 20 or so proficient ringers.

Our first surprise on opening the church door was the sight of George. George has visited our tower occasionally to assist our two patient instructors. Generally he has been garbed in an old sweater over an open-necked shirt and baggy trousers. On this occasion George's six feet three inches were immaculate in a well-cut suit with knife-edge creases, snow-white shirt, and restrained tie. Obviously, we thought, a monthly meeting is some occasion! We were quite right, and our first has left its impressions.

Perhaps the chief of these was that of Charlie, who regularly week by week, aided by Harry, the Guild secretary, comes and patiently (usually) teaches us. Often on practice night have our clashes and faulty striking made him wince and groan. But on this occasion we saw him absolutely, wholly, completely and utterly in his element, his face flushed with pleasure, as he called several touches of really well-struck Stedman with some of the good ringers. If anyone lives for bell-ringing it is Charlie, and we can never thank him enough for coming each week to instruct us, especially as we are not very promising material.

Then there was Harry, who travels about a dozen miles to get to our tower on practice nights, where we see him as a rather quiet but very helpful assistant to Charlie. On the occasion of the meeting we saw him for the first time in action. Unobtrusively, but very efficiently, he guided the meeting on an even keel. Rounds for beginners, something spliced for the experts, the Vicar thanked and put in the picture as regards the service, a touch of 120 Grandsire for novices like Joan and I, the president of the Guild welcomed, six for Bob Minor—Harry managed it all.

On the arrival of the president, who to us was just another ringer, a voice hissed in our ears: 'Here is the

president!' The words were said with such respect that Joan felt she ought to curtsy, and I had a ridiculous impulse to grab a bell-rope and ring wildly, for just at that moment no one was ringing and Harry was organising ringers for rounds. It seemed all wrong that the president should walk into church and find a silent tower.

George is a man of parts. This was brought home to us at the meeting, for his rather sleepy expression completely belies a very active brain, a fact we speedily realised as we saw him ably conducting a most joyous ring in several complicated methods. Then, too, surprise of surprises, he turned organist for the service, playing with feeling and expression.

The service was one which left a definite impression. The whole company sitting at the front of the church, the words of the hymns (new to us) set to familiar tunes, the prayers, and the Ringers' Prayer in particular, and by no means least, the Vicar's talk, so well chosen for the day.

As tea was in the village hall, a furlong distant, and the bells were up, it was decided to lock the church. Joyce, one of our band, pushed the huge key into the lock and there it wedged itself. Not one of us could either tease it out, or coax it to turn. So the Vicar stayed on guard, to be relieved in due course by the vergers who, during his spell on duty managed, by some process known only to himself, to extract the key from the lock; thus all was well.

Although we knew the members of our own band, and Sydney and Tony from a neighbouring tower, there were inevitably many whom we had not seen before, who yet left their mark. The tall man who helped his even taller young son in one or two touches; the young married couple who rang together and looked as if they had always done so; the girl in the black frock whose expression when ringing was so completely composed that one thought nothing could ever ruffle her calm; and the two 12-year-olds who were both so shy of ringing before so many, and yet who managed so well.

These impressions, and many more, contribute to our happy memory of our first ringers' meeting, which has left us with only one regret. Why, oh why, did we not take up bell-ringing 20 years ago, when in our 'teens?

THE PHANTOM PEAL RINGER RIDES AGAIN

THE scene is the village of Amport, in Hampshire; the time, the witching hour of midnight on the first Friday in November. Hallowe'en has come and gone; the countryside lies dark and silent as the grave.

But hark! Do ghouls still walk? What ghostly music fills the air? The villagers stir restlessly in their beds and fearfully recall old legends of yesteryear. Can it be the dreaded phantom ringers?

At Amport R.A.F. Station the sergeant of the guard wakes with a start, the hairs of his scalp tingling. He dons his carpet slippers with shaking fingers, stumbles to the door and listens unbelievably. Are the ancient tales true, or has 'B' Flight broken out again? In any event this is a matter for the civil police, and the sergeant does not hesitate; he dials '999'.

Meanwhile, at the village church, six phantom ringers are conferring with the Rector, who justifiably points out that, although the bells are theoretically fully muffled, they will have to be made a lot quieter before any midnight peal-ringing takes place. Our phantoms can only agree and, as no more muffles are available and the ascent to the bell chamber appears hazardous in the extreme, they reluctantly decide to abandon the attempt and to go on to the next tower.

As certain phantoms sit yawning in their chariot, waiting (as usual) for the phantom tenor king, a Ford car chugs out of the darkness and halts beside them. The following conversation ensues:—

Police Sergeant: 'Good morning!'

Phantoms (in chorus): 'Good morning, officer!'

Police Sergeant: 'Is this the church?'

Phantoms: 'Yes.'

Pause for suspicious glances on both sides.

Police Sergeant: 'You haven't just been in there by any chance, have you?'

First Phantom: 'Er . . .'

Second Phantom: 'Umm . . .'

Third Phantom: 'Yes.'

Police Sergeant (triumphantly, rattling handcuffs and twirling moustache): 'Ah-ha!'

Posse, comprising sergeant, constable and military policeman, pile out of the car and surround quaking phantoms.

Some little time later, explanations having been forthcoming and the full names and addresses of all of our heroes duly noted ('Yes, that's it, officer, Arthur Patrick, my 2,342nd tower, no doubt you've heard of Loughborough . . .') the party made tracks for Abbot's Ann, where attempt No. 2 was scheduled to start at 3 a.m. Arriving two hours early, some time was spent in rendering the muffling as effective as possible without making the bells completely inaudible, and a start was eventually made at half-past one. Winchendon Place Bob Doubles ran smoothly to a successful conclusion, and our spirits rose appreciably.

We slept in the car until breakfast-time (6 a.m.), when we received a warm welcome from the proprietor of the local transport cafe and were brought back to life by bacon, eggs and coffee.

PEP-PILLS!

Seven o'clock saw the party adjusting ropes at Broughton in readiness to attempt the first peal on the bells. Pep-pills were much in evidence here, and those who used them are able to present a very favourable report on their effectiveness: no doubt their use will soon be banned by the Central Council. The steady seven were duly rung on these pleasant bells.

On to Lockerley in brilliant sunshine, where Bill Deason met us looking disgustingly wide awake and sporting a new hat which the late

R. Hood would have been proud to own. It was apparent from the size of the feather that an ostrich was shivering somewhere. Four methods were rung at a stately pace on these musical but somewhat noisy bells.

Lunch was waiting at the village inn, and we sat down well satisfied with our total of three out of four so far, and every prospect of scoring the remaining three to set up a new record.

However, this was not to be. At Sherfield English, where Chris Kippin joined us, Cambridge Major had been tapping along in fine style for nearly two hours when a conducting error put paid to our hopes; a sad disappointment, for this eight certainly rates as one of the most musical in Hampshire.

Over tea it was decided by a majority that the two remaining attempts should still take place, and the party consequently set off for Stockbridge to try for another 'first on the bells.' However, a broken treble rope brought the ringing to a premature conclusion in the third extent. No more luck came our way at Goodworth Clatford, where permission had kindly been given to ring the bells unmuffled from 9 p.m. until midnight; a mysterious fire-up in Cambridge Minor ended the day's ringing.

In spite of the apparently unsuccessful outcome, most of the band were well satisfied with what had been achieved, particularly as the standard of striking had never fallen below good throughout the day, and it is hoped that another attempt will be made in the not too far distant future.

We extend our grateful thanks to seven kind and co-operative incumbents (especially those who gave permission for us to ring at somewhat unusual hours); to all the local ringers who met us; to the phantom tenor king who kept us all awake and was 'not a bit tired but just irritable' at the end; to Geoff Dodd for his customarily impeccable arrangements; and most of all to Dave Hawkins for his fortitude in driving nearly 200 miles without sleep between Friday evening and Sunday morning, ringing three peals, losing divers others and still getting us safely home.

Following a good meal came the toasts, the first of which, 'Church and State,' was proposed by the Mayor of Walsall, who said what pleasure it gave him and the Mayoress to be present that evening. It was essential that the Church and the State work in complete harmony together.

In reply, the Vicar of Walsall stated that Walsall was fortunate in having a man like Cclr. Harrison, who displayed his sterling Christian qualities not only as a churchwarden but in his civic duties also.

Proposing the toast of 'The Society,' the Bishop of Lichfield spoke of his appreciation of the work done by ringers throughout the diocese Sunday by Sunday. He was pleased to know that the Society had a large number of young members, and he appealed to those present that evening to maintain the traditions of the Society in the future.

Replying to this toast, Miss Annette Frost, a young ringer from Penn, said that while ringers obviously got pleasure from their ringing their main satisfaction should be in the service they were rendering to the Church.

The toast of 'The Visitors' was proposed by Mr. G. Darlington, of Wednesbury, who said how delighted he was to see the Mayor and Mayoress of Walsall and the Bishop of Lichfield and Mrs. Reeve giving the dinner their support.

In reply, Mr. A. Wynne Evans, of Wolverhampton, speaking as a non-ringer, said how impressed he was with the spirit of goodwill which obviously existed amongst ringers.

Mr. Bennett (lay secretary) then thanked the Archdeacon of Stafford for so efficiently taking the chair. Thanks were also expressed to the artists for their services. Entertainment which followed was provided by Major B. Pearson (conjurer), Miss Margaret Hyde (soprano), with Mr. K. Wood (accompanist) and Mrs. E. Drew and Miss M. Roden, from Claverley Dramatic Society.

A course of Grandsire Triples on handbells was rung by Messrs. H. Knight, F. Brotherton, E. E. Speake and H. Howell.

During the afternoon ringing took place on the 12 bells at Walsall Parish Church.

In the quarter peal rung at Llantrisant (page 739), the Kerleys who were ringing consisted of a father, two sons and a grandson.

'CAMPANOLOGY'—Some Notes By Wilfrid G. Wilson

SOME of your older readers may remember one of our short-lived ringing papers—'Campanology.' No. 1 was published on September 16th, 1896, and it appeared every Wednesday, price one penny, until No. 26 on March 10th, 1897. Its proprietor was William Bedwell, who had a printing and stationery business in High Street, Lewisham. He was also at that time hon. secretary of the Lewisham District of the Kent County Association.

When the Master at St. Margaret's, Westminster (Mr. William H. Hewett), opened his box in the ringing chamber recently, I saw a set of this journal, and Mr. Hewett was good enough to lend them to me. I found them so interesting that I have made these notes of items which I think may be of interest to others of your readers.

The editorial in the first issue set out Mr. Bedwell's 'plan of campaign.' 'For the benefit of our colleagues in the provinces who may be arranging to visit the Metropolis we intend to publish a list of dates, times and places of meetings for practice in London and its environs.' And he did—every issue up to the last had such a list. Visitors to London nowadays would, I am sure, find a similar list useful. We have, I know, Dove's Guide, but that cannot, by its nature, be always up to date. The provinces could also claim to have similar help and it may be, therefore, that a list published every two or three months would suffice.

The next point in his plan of campaign reminded me of recent editorial decisions about anonymous correspondence. 'We have resolved,' he wrote, 'not to admit any contribution which does not bear the signature of the writer.'

And the next, if it were possible today, would bring joy to the hearts of Association treasurers. 'Notices of meetings will be inserted gratis, thus effecting a saving of expenditure to many Associations—a departure which we feel assured will be generally appreciated.'

J. ARMIGER TROLLOPE

I personally was thrilled to see that the very first peal reported—Oxford Treble Bob Royal at St. Peter Mancroft, Norwich—contained the name of my own teacher, J. Armiger Trollope, who rang the second and composed the peal.

An article entitled 'A country ringer's experiences in the belfry of Westminster Abbey' gave the editor a chance to ride one of his bobby horses—as will be apparent from later extracts also. There were six bells at the time; the floor was unsafe, and Nos. 4 and 5 went so badly that only 'set changes' were rung. 'Ringing goes on, but with frequent intervals for rest.' But they had to spread a newspaper over the seats because of the dirt. 'Part of the carpet [?] was regularly supplied by the pigeons and other birds.' On reaching his native village the writer of the article resolved to get the Central Council to present a humble petition to the Abbey authorities headed 'Cleanliness is next to Godliness.'

In addition to an illustrated article on St. Margaret's, Westminster, which probably accounts for the preservation of these numbers in that belfry, issue No. 2 has an article on peal books by J. Armiger Trollope. To those who knew him as probably the most able historian of bells and ringing that the Exercise has had, his suggestion that Associations which were

hard up should not spend their money on ornamental peal books must seem strange. I wonder if he would have repeated this 50 years later. He made, of course, the valid point that the early peal books were invaluable, but that in days of printed annual reports, available to all, a better use could be found for Association funds.

In this number was started a page of compositions. Peals of Treble Bob Major from 5,024 to 8,128 were given and, what may well have been a hit at rival publications, it was stated that 'the greatest possible care is taken to examine all peals before being inserted in this Journal, by which we hope to avoid the annoyance and disappointment which has often occurred by the publication of false compositions.'

Note for A.P.C. An advertisement said: 'All bell-ringers should have Hovis bread—cures indigestion.'

No. 3, in its editorial, stresses the necessity for the tuition of young members, and makes the statement—still very true today—'Of what avail is all the study and knowledge of seven Surprise men without the eighth?'

Among the peals published were 11,328 London Surprise Major in 6 hours and 6 minutes at Drayton, Berkshire, composed and conducted by J. W. Washbrook, with the Rev. F. E. Robinson in the band, and a peal of Grandsire Triples at Tilehurst, in which Miss Alice White took part. An illustrated article was about St. Martin's, Birmingham, and the composition page, Grandsire Caters.

No. 4 has an illustrated article about St. Mary and All Saints', Chesterfield, with its crooked spire. On reading that when the ten bells (24½ cwt.) were opened in 1820, six peals were rung in two days, one is not surprised that the spire is crooked!

COLLEGE YOUTHS' DINNER, 3s. 6d.

In No. 5 appears the first of a series of advertisements for the 259th anniversary dinner of the Ancient Society of College Youths, price 3s. 6d. For the 321st, this year, the price was 18s. 6d.

Members of the Middlesex Association will be interested to know that No. 6 contained a report of the seventh annual meeting of the Association at Southgate, at which a committee was set up to consider with the South and West Middlesex Guild the desirability of uniting as Districts of one County Association. The Middlesex secretary at that time was Mr. A. T. King, and it is a sign of the times that whenever his name appears in a report of a touch or quarter peal he always gets 'Esq.' put after his name.

OXFORD UNIVERSITY SOCIETY VISIT LONDON

Members of the O.U.S. and their friends, etc., 14 in all, left Oxford on the 9.7 a.m. express on November 15th on the first stage of their outing. Robin Hodgson, an ex-Master, joined us at Paddington. At St. Dunstan's, Stepney, we were met by Mr. Fox and Roger Keeley, who had done much of the arranging on our behalf, and who was to be our guide over London. The magnificent bells were soon heard to Grandsire Caters; the band, which was certainly not overlaid with experience, performed creditably here as elsewhere, and before we reluctantly made our way westwards, Stedman Caters and a half course of Cambridge Royal had been rung, besides a course of Plain Bob and three leads of Kent Royal.

After lunch the first objective was St. Olave's, Hart Street. A little difficulty was experienced at first on this light eight, but before long some good, if not perfect, striking was heard, Dermot Roaf had escaped from the clutches of 'the other place' by this time, and Ruth How and Rodney Meadows also joined us. Several standard methods were rung here besides a short touch of Spliced Surprise in four methods.

We were lagging a little behind schedule by the time we reached St. James', Clerkenwell, and so we shortened our time to 45 minutes. The bells are rather difficult to ring for several reasons, not the least of which is the fact that they are rather deep set. Notwithstanding this difficulty, the best ringing of the day, a course of Yorkshire, was done here.

After this the O.U.S. had to cross London to Pimlico. Here we found that two of the bells had 'run dry' and had to be oiled before we could ring. This limited us to the inevitable three leads of Bristol and Kent, while Dermot was made to apply his mathematical brain to calling a 63 of Stedman. Further reinforced by Jim Cook and Shirley Rymer, we went to St. Margaret's, Westminster, to be joined by one or two of the London University ringers. Mr. Sanders stood in for some Cambridge Royal, and provided an object lesson to some aspiring O.U.S. members on how to handle a heavy bell. Again Grandsire and Stedman Caters were rung, and to finish the day's ringing the Society rang a half course of Yorkshire Royal, which was easily the best 10-bell ringing of the day and ran very close to the Yorkshire at Clerkenwell.

Most of the Oxford party arrived home before midnight, but the Master was grateful for the fog which enshrouded him as he climbed into his college at 2.15 a.m. on Sunday.

Our grateful thanks are due to Roger Keeley; without his help there could have been no outing—certainly not an outing which was as successful and enjoyable as this was. J. H. P.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

UNRINGABLE BELLS

Dear Sir,—The letter from Mr. Nicholas Davies makes both interesting and sad reading—interesting as providing useful information concerning unringable towers in this county, and sad because they are unringable—or reputedly so!

Mr. Davies asks for information on two towers in particular. As regards the 6-bell tower of Sandhurst, these bells, hung in a massive 14th century western tower, were augmented from five during the 1930's. They were rung up to the beginning of the last war, but suffered from neglect during the war and after. To the best of my knowledge, there is very little wrong with the bells that could not be remedied by a few hours' work with spanner, etc. At present, the tenor cannot be raised, as it is striking the frame—this could, of course, be easily remedied—and I expect that the other five would take quite a bit of ringing. Even so, when compared with the condition of the recently reopened Hampshire tower of Sydmonton (actually the 'go' of these reputedly unringable bells is quite fair!), no one, I am convinced, would be prepared to include Sandhurst as a genuinely unringable tower.

St. Margaret's, Rochester, is rather different. Here again, the pleasant-toned light eight, which are hung anti-clockwise in a good 15th century west tower, were rung up to the outbreak of war. The frame and fittings are, I understand, in very poor condition indeed; in addition, about a quarter of the ground floor ringing chamber is now blocked by a large heating stove, and at least two of the ropes would now fall on top of this stove. Even were the bells in good ringing order, it would be quite impossible to ring them under present conditions. The only possibility would be a ringers' gallery, installed at the level of the sill of the west window, or slightly higher—even then, the ringers standing over the stove would no doubt have rather a warm time!

I fear that Mr. Davies' information about the other towers is only too correct, although, with him, I am very much inclined to doubt whether all the reputedly unsafe towers are really so. Personally, as regards Mr. Davies' local tower of Kennington, I have heard many well-known ringers in the Ashford area say that the story of the unsafe tower is quite untrue, and, although I have never inspected the bells myself, I am inclined to agree. However, only an inspection by a qualified bell-hanger could decide one way or the other in this and the other 'unsafe' towers in the county, and I trust that this may one day take place.

Finally, there is one more unringable tower which Mr. Davies has not mentioned, and this is—unlike some of the others—a genuine case. The tower in question is Chislet, where the heavy ring of six has, I think, not been rung within living memory. Happily, in this case, restoration is in progress, and the bells are now in process of being rehung by Taylors. I believe it is hoped that they will be in good ringing order by early in 1959.—Yours sincerely,

FIRST PEAL PERFORMANCES

Dear Sir,—Mr. Barnett is correct: Caversham Major was accidentally omitted from the MS which I submitted to the Editorial Office. A peal of 5,040 was rung at Caversham on July 15th, 1913, by the Oxford Diocesan Guild. The method was first published as Washbrook's Surprise Principle, but this name was later changed to Caversham Major.

The peal of Maidstone Major at Wakefield was reported as '5,760, being the extent of 120 courses, with 1, 7, 8 fixed'. A further 5,760 was rung at Borden, Kent, in 1813, followed by 5,856 (122 courses) in 1814. Thus we have a course of 48 changes, and I fail to see how this could fit in as a hunt-controlled method. It was therefore included in the list of Principles.

Cox's Caters was reported as 'a peal of Caters on Cox's Principle on December 7th, 1845, in 3 hours and 45 minutes, composed and conducted by John Cox.'

There is no complete list of all first performances. In 'History and Art', Mr. Morris made improvements on the C.C. list of 1923, which list was incomplete in many ways. Since the publication of 'History and Art' early performances in other methods and also some earlier dates have come to light. Only by publishing in 'The Ringing World' everything known can we hope to arrive at something like a complete list. If someone sees a mistake in the lists, or notes an omission, I hope they will not sit back and say, 'That list is incomplete.' Instead, like Mr. Barnett, they should put pen to paper and send details to 'The Ringing World.' In this way we might arrive at a complete list of First Peal Performances. The absence of such letters appears to indicate that the lists so far are complete and accurate.

Mr. R. I. Shepherd has sent details of Aston Major, which is the same as Handsworth, but the 12 places are moved to 34.

ST. MARGARET'S, ROCHESTER

Dear Sir,—Re Kent's unringable bells, I would like to submit the following to Mr. Nicholas J. Davies:—

St. Margaret's, Rochester, has a ring of eight (tenor 13½ cwt. in G.). The bells were originally a ring of six, and I believe they were augmented to eight by Gillett and Johnston. The dates of the back six are as follows: Treble 1790, 2nd 1884, 3rd 1790, 4th 1621, 5th 1624, tenor 1884. There have not been many peals rung here. It is a left-handed ring with a draught of about 30 ft. with no guides. I believe the Rev. F. E. Robinson called Stedman Triples here, and I think Frank Bennett and A. H. Pulling have both called peals here. The bells are musical, and I have rung in three peals here—two of Kent T.B. and one of Grand-sire (the last peal on the bells, February 14th, 1948).

The bells need rehanging, new ropes and fittings, but finance and lack of ringers is the trouble. The bells at Wouldham are a ring of six by Mears (tenor 13½ cwt. in G.). They were rung about two months ago for the induction of a new vicar by the ringers from Meopham, Kent.—Yours, etc.,

REDEDICATION

Desborough, Northants

The rededication of the bells of St. Giles', Desborough, took place on November 19th. The bells have been retuned, refitted with new wooden wheels, back-stays and slides, and remounted with totally-encased ball-bearings.

The ceremony was performed by Canon G. F. Turner, R.D., president of the Diocesan Guild of Bell-ringers, and other clergy taking part were the Vicar (Rev. T. R. Bonsey) and the Vicar of Loddington (Rev. G. Dolman). In the procession the cross was carried by a ringer, David Loake.

The ringers who rang rounds after the rededication were Miss Gwenyth Dimbleby, Miss Sonia Feakin, Mrs. A. Loake, Messrs. H. Tailby, G. Wright, D. Loake, B. Foster and B. Yeomans.

After the service, members of the congregation were invited to refreshments in the Hall, while visiting ringers from Rothwell, Corby, Weldon and Kettering joined the local band to ring Grandsire Triples, Bob Major and Little Bob Major. All agree that a fine job of work has been done—the noise in the belfry is almost down to zero, and the sound outside is also reported to be greatly improved.

It is a great credit to the band that the work was carried out as economically as possible, and that all the money for it has been raised or promised.

On the gift day £600 was given—an example of generosity towns of greater population and wealth might follow. It is hoped that a grant from the Diocesan Bell Restoration Fund will be made.

GOSPEL OAK BELLS RING AGAIN

There are only six 6-bell towers in the county of London, and all of them have been unringable for some years. In a survey of these towers recently undertaken it was found that the most likely one to be made ringable again was that of St. Martin's, Gospel Oak. The bells had been silent for 8½ years, and inspection showed that while the frame and fittings were basically sound, a lot of work had to be done to make them usable again.

This work included the fitting of a completely new wheel to the third, the checking and lubrication of bearings, sliders, clappers, etc., and the repair of wheel rims and spokes. The ropes were fortunately in good order, except for one which had been pulled up into the belfry and left lying around the broken wheel exposed to London's grime. This rope was rejuvenated by being washed, sally and all, in strong detergent solution, with a remarkably satisfactory result.

On Saturday, November 15th, a band from St. Matthias', Richmond, assisted by a ringer from Somerset on a visit to London, went to the church and rang the bells for the first time after their long silence. The tone was most pleasing and the 'go' excellent. To the great delight of the Vicar (Rev. Leslie St. Aubrey), who has given his wholehearted support to this amateur restoration effort, a quarter peal of Grandsire Doubles was rung.

Those responsible for this restoration think there must be many rings in the country which could be restored and made ringable again at small expense by ringers sufficiently enthusiastic to do the work themselves, especially in towers where financial stringency precludes a professional restoration. At any rate, they are now turning their attention to other 'unringable' bells in London.

The writer would like to place on record his thanks for the help and advice, freely given, which he has received from Messrs. Mears and Stainbank, who have also supplied the necessary new parts.

OBITUARY

THE REV. S. A. GIDLOW

Visitors to Goodworth Clatford, Hants, will regret to hear of the death of the Vicar, the Rev. S. A. Gidlow, on November 8th. On that day he set out to meet a visiting peal band, but it was doubtful if he ever reached the church as he was found lying at the end of his drive and died on his way to hospital. The peal attempt was unsuccessful.

Mr. Gidlow was a ringer, and practised the art until ill-health prevented him from climbing the belfry stairs. Nevertheless, he kept in close touch with ringers, and until 1953 was chairman of the Andover District. Many outing parties and visiting peal bands will remember the teas he and Mrs. Gidlow generously provided at the Vicarage.

When Mr. Gidlow was inducted to the living in 1936, Goodworth Clatford had only three bells, although there was a frame for six. He resolved to set about raising the extra money. In the next year, for the Coronation of King George VI, two new trebles were added, and a third bell was the gift of the Iremonger family. A number of peals have since been rung on the bells.

MR. REUBEN WRIGHT

The death occurred at his home at Theberton, Suffolk, of Mr. Reuben Wright at the age of 89 years, following a heart attack. It was only in July of 1957 that Reuben gave £1,000 towards the restoration of Theberton bells and tower, costing £1,800. After the funeral an attempt was made to ring a half-muffled peal on Theberton bells, but came to an end in the fourth extent. Ringers taking part were R. Peck 1, J. Pilgrim 2, A. Pipe 3, E. Pearce 4, A. Bridges 5, J. Bailey (conductor) 6.

MEMORIAL TABLET TO MR. F. B. YATES

On October 26th, during morning service at King's Norton Parish Church, a bronze tablet to the memory of Frank Bertram Yates, a former churchwarden and noted Birmingham industrialist was unveiled by the Vicar (Rev. A. E. Ashford) in the presence of a large congregation. Those present included Mrs. Yates and members of the family; Messrs. Frank E. Haynes and Albert Walker represented St. Martin's Guild.

The Vicar in his sermon paid a moving tribute to Mr. Yates' services for many years, his raising of £2,000 for restoration of the church, his gift of two treble bells, increasing the ring to ten bells, and his services as a bell-ringer.

The tablet reads as follows:—

Frank Bertram Yates. Born 23rd January, 1877. Died 4th March, 1957. Ringing Master 1924–1926.

Mr. Yates was a vice-president of St. Martin's Guild and gave two treble bells to Birmingham Cathedral, increasing the ring to 12 bells.

A WEEK IN LINCOLNSHIRE

It was westward on Thursday to Eagle, Swindon, Norton Disney, Bassingham, and to the heaviest six of the week at Brant Broughton (tenor 23½ cwt.). Once more we crossed into Notts to Coddington, where the treble was without a stay, and so to Newark for lunch. Back again into Lincoln to Claypole (bells out of tune), Hough-on-the-Hill, Honington, Barkston, Barrowby and Denton, where we had considerable trouble with the clock hammers. Having time to spare, we entered into Leicestershire, only to find that Croxton Kerrial bells were at the founders'. Bert was persuaded to go without his tea, and we had a ring on the merry six at Eaton. Eastward bound to the Somerset-type tower at Great Ponton, a minor five and the heaviest-going five of the week, and Ancaster. Then to Fulbeck for a touch of Fulbeck Bob Minor, before joining the local practice night at Leadenham, where the Vicar rang with us.

'TWICE MORE'

Eastwards on Friday to four close towers—Nettleham, Welton, Scothern and Dunholme—where we achieved a course of Beverley Surprise. Then on to Wragby, where two incidents occurred. Philip's rope caught on a clock case and caused some confusion, and when lowering the bells, Dick, unusually on the treble, got about half way down and called 'Twice more,' missed, caught, and all rose some way off the floor. Legbourne was the last tower before lunch in Mablethorpe, after which we rang at the parish church, on a very good six.

North to Saltfleetby All Saints', only to find the tower to be unsafe and the bells fixed with strings tied to the clappers. At Saltfleetby St. Clement's the vicar kindly left us some refreshment. Waltham's proved to be a very good six, but at Laceby the tower was in scaffolding. On to Ulceby, Caistor with its long, steep stairway, Claxby, where the locals made a recording of our ringing, and to the lightest six of the week at Bigby (tenor 6 cwt.). Finally to Broughton once again, successful this time in finding the sexton at home. These fine six in a Saxon tower are well worth a return visit.

THE RUTLAND FESTIVAL

On Saturday we joined the many visitors to the Rutland festival, and were pleased to meet friends from Bedford. Joe E. G. Roast had now joined us and was somehow squeezed into the car. On our way down we called at the new five at Waddington, Skillington and Colsterworth. We then rang at the available towers in Rutland, to mention just Oakham, Greatham, Cottesmore and Belton as being outstanding.

The Lincoln ringers were most helpful in arranging for us to ring at the four towers in the city on the Sunday morning, especially as we were privileged to ring on the excellent 12 at the Cathedral, also on the eight at St. Giles', and the two sixes of St. Peter-at-Gowts and St. Botolph's. After lunch we found the Nocton tower captain at home, and obtained the key to ring. On to Ashby-de-la-Launde, where the bells were described as 'rough but ringable,' and where the fourth ringer was well rung by his bell. Then to the last two Lincolnshire towers at Great Hale and Helpringham, before heading south to call at Clenchwarton, Norfolk, for evening service. Our last ringing came at Ingham, in Suffolk, where our spare rope proved useful on the tenor.

So on bidding farewell to Philip at Ardleigh we once more arrived at Chelmsford station, but this time to part, with 1,273 miles behind us, and 111 towers in seven counties and 21 different methods to our collection. One cannot thank Ivan enough for all his work in correspondence, Dick for his excellent driving, and Bert for keeping the party amused; also to all incumbents and local ringers who either met us or permitted us to ring—in fact to everyone who helped to make this week so enjoyable.
