## **OUR MOST DISTANT BELLS**

FOR 85 years the bells of Christchurch Cathedral, New Zealand, have rung out Sunday by Sunday giving their message; and the story of the bells is vividly told in "Bobs and Singles," a history of the Christchurch Cathedral Society, written by Patricia Ward, the wife of one of the ringers and a former Master of the Society.

The donor of these bells was Mr. R. H. Rhodes, and his desire was to have eight bells of the same weight as the recently hung ring in St. Paul's Cathedral. Mr. A. Troyte, regarded then as the leading authority, suggested a ring of ten instead of a heavy eight, and to this the Cathedral authorities agreed, but when the sanction arrived Messrs. John Taylor and Co. had already made the moulds for the eight. The two trebles were added as the gift of Mr. E. P. W. Miles. Before leaving England the bells were inspected by Dr. Stainer, organist of St. Paul's Cathedral, and Mr. Troyte and pronounced to be a magnificent ring.

Gratitude to the donor is expressed by the following inscription on the tenor:

Through all the ROADS of life, the best We'll strive to be your guide; And let our notes do your behest By tolling far and wide. We ve crossed the seas to this fair land, To do God all the honou; From clime to clime we'll ring our chime, And tell of Rhodes the donor.

Not to be outdone the story is continued by the following verse on the trebles:

We, two little bells to complete the chime Were nearly left out too late. When MILES to the rescue, but just in time, Added us on to the eight.

The Society of Christchurch Cathedral Bell Ringers was formed on November 19th, 1880, with Mr. T. B. Hall, an experienced English ringer and a member of the Ancient Society of College Youths, as the first Master. Practices were held on the light bells of St. Paul's, Papanui, which had been installed that year. The blessing of the Cathedral bells took place nearly 12 months later, on October 31st, when some 150 people crowded into the ringing chamber having mounted the spiral staircase. The ceremony was performed by the Bishop of Christchurch and Primate of New Zealand (Bishop H. J. C. Harper).

The service of consecration of the Cathedral took place the following day, the architect being Sir George Gilbert Scott. The Mayor declared the day a public holiday, and the bells were rung at intervals from 6.30 a.m. to 10.30 p.m. The first evidence of change ringing recorded was 120 changes of Grandsire Doubles on August 27th, 1882, and in June of the following year came the first 720 of Grandsire Doubles and on December 16th 1,200 Grandsire Doubles.

In May, 1890, it was reported to the Cathedral Chapter that the ninth bell, used for daily services, was cracked. The architect suggested that further damage might be stopped by having a hole drilled in the metal above and below the crack, then cutting it off from the uninjured metal. The crack was through "clocking." This bell was sent home to be recast and the eighth with it to test the pitch, tuning forks being unknown in those days. The work was most satisfactory and the ninth became the best-toned bell in the ring.

The Society went ahead during the Boer War and scored its first peal—Grandsire Doubles. The arrival in Christchurch of T. W. Biddle from Ballaraat influenced ringing considerably. He was self-taught through reading Jasper Snowdon's books. A personality in the tower was W. Jones, who for 30 years rang the tenor. At the word "go" he would turn his face to the wall and maintain a steady pull. A peal of Bob Triples was scored on the light eight in January, 1903, to be followed later in the year by a peal of Grandsire Triples. That year was notable for its ringing activities, in all 43,000 changes being rung—Grandsire Doubles and Triples, Bob Minor, Triples, Major, and Caters. Stedman Triples was not introduced until 1908.

The arrival from Birmingham of G. H. Clayton in 1911 had a big influence on the Society and in his reminiscences later in life he comments that he was amazed at the allround competence of the men, who could all ring Grandsire, Plain Bob and Stedman. On various occasions Mr. Clayton was Master, and it was a pleasure for Mr. T. J. Lock and the Editor to meet him in 1965. For many years he seems to have been the mainstay of the Society.

"The Great Adventure" party to visit New Zealand in 1934 consisted of Messrs. W. H. Fussell (Slough), G. Martin, J. Hardcastle (Bradford), R. Maude (Pudsey) and W. Linter (Fareham). The week spent at Christchurch was marked by extensive ringing practices and hospitable entertainment. Two attempts were made for a peal of Bob Major. The first was lost after 70 minutes due to a rope jumping on the fifth, and the second when in sight of home two bells changed course after ringing for three hours and 13 minutes. The band consisted of G. Nelson Sloan 1, S. H. Barnett 2, W. Linter 3, J. S. Wilde 4, C. Charge 5, W. H. Fussell 6, B. Shaw 7, G. Martin 8.

And G. Nelson Sloan was still ringing with enthusiasm when Great Adventure II went to Christchurch in 1965. But Nelson during the interval had travelled far; he had toured England visiting 55 towers and had been elected a member of the College Youths. During the Second World War he kept the Society together, and it is an indication of patriotism that, out of an active membership of 12, nine served with the Forces and all returned home safely.

## Worcestershire and Districts Association

THE annual meeting of the Worcestershire THE annual meeting of the Worcestershire and Districts Association commenced as usual on Easter Monday with ringing on the ten bells of All Saints', Worcester, followed by the annual service. In the absence of the Association's chaplain, the service was conducted by the Rector of All Saints' the Rev J. G. Barnish, M.A., who used the Association's form of service. During the course of the service a course of Grandsire Triples was rung on handbells by M J. Fellows 1-2, J. C. Eisel 3-4. J. D. Johnson 5-6, and D. Beacham 7-8.

Following the service, members transferred to the Cathedral Chapter House for the annual general meeting, the Association's president, the Dean of Worcester (the Very Rev. R. L. P. Milburn, M.A.) being in the chair.

This year it had proved possible to send the annual report to members in advance, thus giving them a chance to read the officers' reports and accounts beforehand. This, how-ever, did not prompt any members into asking ever, did not prompt any members into asking questions when the reports came up for discussion. In his report of the recent Central Committee meeting, the general secretary, Mr. D. Beacham, mentioned that a grant of £50 had been promised to St. Thomas's, Stourbridge, bell restoration scheme and that arrangements for a one-day ringing course were being considered.

### POSTAL VOTES REJECTED

Before proceeding to the election of officers, Before proceeding to the election of officers, the president stated that some postal votes had been handed to the general secretary immediately prior to the meeting. The president said that as the rules of the Association did not say this method of voting was permitted, then, in his opinion they could not be taken into account. This year there were again two candidates for the office of Association Master, namely Mr. W. B. Cartwright and Mr. M. D. Fellows. Following election speeches and voting by show of hands (a proposition for a secret ballot having been rejected), Mr. W. B. Cartwright was re-elected by 43 to seven votes.

The peal secretary reported that 62 peals were rung by 155 members in 31 towers; of the peal ringing members 77 were resident and 78 non-resident. Six members rang their first peal and there were three new conductors.

Cooper, rang at the age of 80; and, at the other end of the scale, the peal of Bob Minor at Stoulton, which Andrew Jopp (aged 13) conducted, with his brother Paul (aged eight) ringing the second. D. ### TRIBUTES TO THE LATE Mr. T. G. MYERS

From A. L. Bennett.

By the death of Mr. Tom Myers during the Easter week-end after a trying illness, the South West of England has lost one of its most outstanding ringers, and he leaves a wide gap which will not be easy to fill.

As a ringer, whether on a light or a heavy bell, his handling was really superb, and he was equally superb as a conductor, not forgetting the fact that he always expected a very high standard of striking.

His peals, it is believed, numbered 243 and they were rung in many parts of the country and on all numbers of bells. I am subject to correction, but he had completed the circorrection, but he had completed the circuits in at least four methods, viz., Plain Bob, Stedman, Kent TB and Cambridge Surprise. In addition to ringing peals at Buckfast Abbey, the most westerly 12 in the country, he had also rung a peal on the most northerly 12, at Newcastle on Tyne.

Another of his peal ringing experiences was taking part in the first resident peals of Double Norwich Court Bob Major and Oxford Treble Bob Major, and his passing now leaves me the only survivor of that band.

At the time of his death he was captain at St. Andrew's, Plymouth, and he had served the Guild of Devonshire Ringers truly and faithfully, having been the South West Branch secretary for 19 years and during the past 12 months its chairman. He had also been a Central Council representative since 1949, and it was only in recent times that he was elected

a vice-president of the Guild.

Tom is no longer with us, but his memory will always remain with those of us who knew him so well, and I think it would be quite fitting if some form of memorial could be erected in the church he served so faithfully and so well.

### WHY SOME METHODS ARE RUBBISH

If one "invents" a method in these days it is almost certain to have been already invented or is classified as rubbish or both, yet it is fairly easy to produce something short and much more musical than standard methods but which cannot go to an extent. To the ignorant one would imagine that musical quality was the criterion, and long-drawn out dodging would be boring. Yet Double Oxford is a standard. Never having heard it rung. I do not know as to its music, but it looks deadly dull!

As to peals, I am not a peal ringer, five in 85 years, I think, but I take off my hat to those who are. In my experience they are always extremely helpful to the ignorant, both always extremely fletplot to the ignorant both in tower and correspondence and we would be much poorer without them. Many a country tower only realises what first-class ringing can be when visited by a peal band. Long may peal tours be with us.

### IMBER BELLS GOING TO EDINGTON PRIORY

Dear Sir.—Further to my letter on page 148 regarding the disposal of the Imber bells, it was finally decided at the P.C.C. meeting at St. Francis Church, Salisbury, to give the five bells to Edington Priory, which is to become a ten-bell tower.

The Council agreed that it was more important to complete the interior of the unfinished church rather than pay £2,000 for the recasting and hanging of the bells at present. Also the bells had been stored at Messrs. Mears and Stainbank's for some considerable time and were taking up valuable storage space, which was another reason pressing for the disposal of the bells. the disposal of the bells.

Meanwhile the interest at St. Francis' has not completely diminished. By gentle persuasion of the writer, one member of the P.C.C. has realised the importance of bells in church worship, who in turn suggested that one bell should be hung in the tower, with the idea that when the church is complete a new idea that when the church is complete a new light ring of six bells be installed. This was generally agreed. So the sound of bells should come from the tower of St. Francis' Church yet.—Yours faithfully,

### "LEFT OVER RIGHT"

Dear Sir,—I am, unlike Mr. Jones (letter, page 216), apparently "not conforming to modern standards" (T. J. Lock, page 179) since I ring 'left over right." Though, Mr Jones, in your argument I fail to see any connection between handling ropes and handling cricket basis ling cricket bats.

In my tower the instructnor, quite rightly, lets the beginner decide which is his/her strongest and most comfortable way to handle the bell rope. To determine this, the beginner is subjected to a short tug of war, using the tail-end of the rope. The result of this experiment usually shows the beginner to be most comfortable employing "left over right." (I consider this to be right-handed, as do most tug of war teams h do most tug of war teams!)

Since our present concern is that of hand-ling ropes (and not bats) I feel a comparison with a tug of war team more relevant. Now, applying this in Mr. Jones' argument, this proves nothing.

Finally, it is interesting to note that the majority of "right over left's" have to swap the tail-end from their left hand to their right to tie the rope; also, the more advanced "right over left" ringer uses his right hand to ring single-handed !—Yours faithfully, London, N.W. M.C.F.

### "LONG TEN"

Dear Sir,—I was interested to read Mr. Cook's letter referring to the "long ten." I came across the practice a few years ago, when I often attended Evensong at Chippenham. Cambridgeshire. I do not recall the name by which it was known there but as far as I can remember it was terminated by the calls "five in" and "four in" at successive treble leads after a suitable length, usually five or ten minutes. These calls in effect produced the other two leads of Grandsire, thus bringing up rounds.

I do not see why this form of ringing should bridge the gap between call changes and method ringing better than normal plain hunting (I am anti-"learning the numbers") but I think it is more probably of interest in studying the evolution of method ringing. Cannot we learn something of the way our predecessors thought from these old practices? -Yours faithfully,

## Rededication of Wittersham (Kent) Bells

IT was cold and blustery on April 2nd, when the bells of St. John the Baptist, Wittersham, Kent, were rededicated by the Rector (the Rev. E. C. Lucey) during Matins.

The church was beautiful with the Easter decorations, lilies in the Sanctuary, daffodils, primroses and other flowers elsewhere. At the entry to the belfry steps there was a large entry to the beltry steps there was a large bowl of multi-coloured polyanthus and smaller jars of the same flowers in little niches on the stairway. General ringing for about an hour preceded the service. After singing the bellringers' hymn the Rector and choir, together with the family and friends of the man to whom the bells were to be rededicated, and the many ringers present, proceeded to the base of the tower, where the Rector rededicated the bells "to the glory of God and to the memory of Herman Anton Andreae."

Present at the service was his daughter, Lady Mallett (a member of the local band of ringers), at whose instigation the work was carried out and who was also responsible for having the ringing chamber floor repaired.

The sermon was preached by the Rev. Mr. Graham-Harrison, a retired clergyman from Northamptonshire, who has recently come trom Northamptonshire, who has recently come to live in Wittersham, and who took as his two-fold text "They work—to the glory of God." He spoke along the lines that whilst bellringers were members of their own band or team, they were also members of the band within the whole Church.

After the service the ringers, numbering about 40, returned to the belfry for further ringing. The bells have been retuned, turned and rehung in a cast iron frame, with provision for two trebles to be added at a later date, and they now run in a clockwise direction. ### A USEFUL PAMPHLET

Based on its unique experience of 80 years of accident risks. the Ecclesiastical Insurance Office Ltd. has produced a useful "Stop Accidents!" pamphlet calling attention to accidents arising from churches and halls.

Of church bells, it is stated "Church bells are seldom in other than careful and competent hands. Accidents happen when rules are broken or when inspection and maintenance fail. Bell accidents are serious. Some of the worst have resulted from failure effectively to keep visitors out when the bells are up."

A picture calls attention to "Dark steps are a danger." and asks "Consider controlling lights by key or time switch. When steps are hidden behind a door, keep it locked when practical and show a warning notice." Even experienced ringers with many towers to their credit have been known to slip on dangerous stairs."

The E.I.O. gave helpful assistance to a lady who slipped when visiting a church last Christmas and fractured her ankle. She is still incapacitated and E.I.O. are standing by her. It cannot be over-emphasised the importance of bellringers being protected for the modest premium of one shilling a year paid by the P.C.C. in their cover with E.I.O. The inquiry is well worth while.

### BELLRINGING INTRODUCED TO A FRENCH GIRL
